How to Keep from Falling

"For thou hast delivered my soul from death: wilt not thou deliver my feet from falling, that I may walk before God in the light of the living?" (Psalm 56:13)

Once a person receives Christ as his Savior, he must begin and then continue in the Christian life. There will be many temptations, sorrows, and difficulties along the way, however, as well as many pressures to recant. How is the "babe" in Christ to keep from stumbling and falling?

The answer, of course, is that we are kept by the same grace that saved us in the first place! The Lord Jesus died to save us from eternal death in hell; surely we can "be saved by his life" from falling while living (Romans 5:10). Our beautiful text verse anticipates this great New Testament truth. If the Lord can deliver my soul from death, surely He can keep my feet from falling! Other wonderful verses in the Psalms give the same assurance. For example,

"The steps of a good man are ordered by the LORD: and he delighteth in his way. Though he fall, he shall not be utterly cast down: for the LORD upholdeth him with his hand" (Psalm 37:23–24).

It is important that each person professing faith in Christ be sure that his faith is real, founded on the true Jesus Christ as Creator, Redeemer, and Lord, and not a sentimental faith in "another Jesus . . . or another gospel" (2 Corinthians 11:4). As Peter urges, "Give diligence to make your calling and election sure: for if ye do these things, ye shall never fall" (2 Peter 1:10).

And then, in the last words of the New Testament before the book of Revelation, we are directed again to Christ.

"Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen" (Jude 1:24–25).

What a blessed assurance is this! HMM

Thankful in the Waiting Inspiration comes from: The Way of the Wildflower by Ruth Chou Simons

Vibrant Colorado wildflowers dotted the landscape only a few weeks ago, but now, their appearance is lackluster at best. The sun is still bright overhead, but there's a crispness in the air that tells me a new season is on its way.

Every year, as I watch the wildflowers fade, I'm reminded of the lessons they still have to teach us. Autumn may be a prequel to winter, but if we live in the way of the wildflower, it's not a season to be lamented.

By God's grace, the wildflowers in bloom remind us what it looks like to be dependent, free, resilient, unhurried, and beloved. But do you know what happens as they go dormant? Roots that were strengthened by spring and summer winds remain protected in the soil and wait for moisture from the gentle covering of winter snow. Just under the surface, invisible work is preparing the wildflowers for a new season of growth that is yet to come.

Wildflowers don't protest their dormancy... they are patient, submitting to God's plan in a long season of waiting. What if we, too,

From the Pastor's Heart...

If there is one thing that many people have in common it's the propensity to worry. This is also true for many who profess to be Christian. I can remember as a youngster that a certain lady in our neighborhood was known to be a "worrywart". When I first heard of her "condition", I thought she was actually inflicted with some kind of physical wart that caused her to worry. When I asked my Mother about this matter, she explained to me that the label "worrywart" had nothing to do with a physical problem but meant a person chooses to worry about many things that can happen in life.

Recently, I was talking with a person, whose name will remain anonymous, who labeled herself as a "worrywart". I reminded her that God doesn't want us to worry about things, but to talk to Him about whatever the issue(s) may be.

In fact, it's true that to worry is actually a sin. In Luke 12:22-23 Jesus told the people of his time: "Do not worry about your life, what you will eat; nor about the body, what you will put on. Life is more than food, and the body is more than clothing."

You see, worry is not part of our personality; it is not something to be excused because "everybody does it." From God's perspective, worry is a sin.

Now it is certainly proper to be concerned about things that are your responsibility and over which you have control. That's because God expects us to be responsible, to be concerned that we follow through on what is ours to do.

But worry is about concerning yourself over things over which you have no control. Worry is allowing cares and concerns to escalate beyond the realm of responsibility and into a realm in which you have no authority or control - God's realm. That kind of concern, which is worry, is sin. When this occurs, we deny the faithfulness of God and Jesus's command "not to worry" thereby setting ourselves up to allow the enemy of our souls to tempt us not to trust God.

When tempted to worry, the best choice to make is to trust God. The Bible tells us: "Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and he will make your paths straight" (Proverbs 3:5-6).

Remember, For the child of God, "We know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose" (Romans 8:28-29).

As you choose to fully trust in God, may the peace, joy and love of God dispel the temptation to worry and give you an abundant life in Christ Jesus.

Clerk's Report: Session granted permission to place a sign on church property in recognition of November being "Resilience Awareness Month".

Pastor's Report: Shut in's Communion served on 12/8/25 to Shirley Siniapkin, Teresa Aberth and Toni Yunker.

Worship Report: Christmas Eve Candlelight Service will not include Communion.

Witness Report: The Website needs upgrading. Scott Miller is still providing financially for the website. Food Pantry: 6 people received assistance in November. The pantry received a significant amount of food this past month as a result of the Livingston County Worker's Food Drive. The pantry also received a donation from the York Central School teachers. LEPC worshippers provided 10 gifts, for the "Christmas Sharing Program".

Missions: Session approved donations to the Christmas Sharing Program, Reclaimed Ministries, Inc. in support of Missionaries Tim and Bernadette Negus, Prison Fellowship's Angel Tree (Christmas) Ministry, and a year end donation to EduNations. "If waiting is this fruitful, we can't afford not to be patient—awake, faithful, and watchful for God's plans and purposes with eager anticipation. After all, we know how the story ends, and we can be confident that nothing is wasted." (The Way of the Wildflower, Meditation #22, "When You're Still Waiting")

You might feel lost, forlorn, and forgotten, but we know with certainty that God is faithful. As the psalmist said in Psalm 73:23-26, ESV

Nevertheless, I am continually with You; You hold my right hand.

The Most Cherished Gift

Each Christmas when I was a kid, like clock-work, and no matter what was going on, I could always count on receiving a blunt, circular object wrapped in plain green and red tissue paper. It was as dependable as the Christmas tree going up on Thanksgiving weekend and Santa's visit always happening after I finally fell asleep. I just knew it would always be there. Now, I've always been that guy who inspects presents carefully when no one is watching. So, if the size, shape, and wrapping paper didn't give it away, the fact that its contents always jingled when I picked it up and shook it confirmed what was inside the carefully wrapped gift. As I got older, I didn't even bother checking it before I opened it. You see, every single year of my childhood, this was the little package left for me at Christmas

from my grandma Luella West.

Grandma raised ten kids, and most of them got married and had kids of their own. So she literally had a small village of grandchildren to buy for at Christmas. My grandparents never had much money anyway, but after my grandpa passed away in 1984, things were even tighter for my grandma. No matter the circumstances of her life, she always welcomed a visit from all the members of the big West clan. And she enjoyed celebrating during our annual Christmas visits to northern Iowa, even later in her life when she was dealing with health issues. My grandma never let her situation stop her from giving a Christmas gift to each of her many grandchildren. There was something special about the simplicity and sacrifice in her giving that still sticks with me all these years later.

I guess I understand very clearly now how hard she had to work and how carefully she had to save throughout the year just so I could

I remember those moments when my brother and I would sit together and unwrap Grandma's gift to find the same Gerber baby food jar. That was her offering to us each year. A container, carefully wrapped and filled with one hundred pennies. Each and every one of the West grandchildren received a dollar for Christmas.

Of course, as a kid, you are always going to be more allured by the bigger gifts like a pair of Nikes, baseball cards, or a remote-controlled car. Those were the kinds of things we received from our parents and other relatives on Christmas morning. As the presents were opened, I would politely thank my grandma for her gift and then quickly set it aside (secretly disappointed), ready to move on to the more flashy and exciting ones. I'll admit, at the time, the significance of her gift was lost on me. The sacrifice Grandma West made to give us that dollar went completely unappreciated. To be honest, most years I held out hope that she would give me something different. But there it was, year after year after year, a blunt, round, jingly baby food jar filled with a hundred pennies.

As I grew older and wiser, I began to realize what it meant for her to give all of us that gift. It actually became a cherished moment that I always looked forward to at Christmas. My brother and I began to anticipate her present with some teenage humor like, "Where are you going to spend your dollar from Grandma?" But in reality, we had grown to really treasure her intention.

I don't know if I fully understood how much my grandma's

faithful giving truly captured the heart of Christmas until the year I graduated from college. I remember that she was one of my biggest cheerleaders and was always so proud of me. She was also really supportive of my music dreams and let everyone know about it. When you are just starting out, faith and belief from the people who love you can be like wind in your sails. I always laugh when I think about how she used to tell me that I was going to be the next Elvis Presley! And I will never forget our visit when she sat me down and told me, "Matthew, someday you're going to play the Grand Ole Opry!" You know, she wound up being right (about the Grand Ole Opry, not Elvis). She had really big hopes for me.

The Christmas before I graduated from college, she presented me with another blunt, jingly gift wrapped in the same paper as every year, but this one was somewhat bigger than what I had come to expect in years past. That particular present would be the best Christmas gift I ever received. You know, when I think back on my life now, the memories of all the big, flashy, or expensive Christmas presents I got as a kid have faded away, but I still remember Grandma West's. And I am still impacted by the lesson her gift taught me about the heart of Christmas.

Christmas is my absolute favorite holiday, but I am aware it is all too often commercial, material, full of big price tags, big events, big noise, and constant busyness. Even in the West house, sometimes we go big with our celebrations and

stack the presents taller than the one who is opening them! Many of us can take the holiday celebrations a little bit over the top. But if I'm being honest, while all those things are fun, they aren't ever the truly meaningful moments. None of them make Christmas the homecoming it is supposed to be. I still think often about Grandma West and how the simplicity and sacrifice of her giving continually points me toward the heart of that first Christmas and the manger.

Because the true story of Christmas is the gift of a humble King in humble beginnings.

When we take a break from the chaos of the season and stop looking to fill the empty spaces in our lives with the world's empty promises and false hopes, we find the meaning, intention, and sacrifice all right there in God's love story to us.

I want to invite you to turn your heart back toward the greatest gift ever given. I want you to remember this Christmas how all God's blessings began, with the unexpected gift of eternal hope lying in a manger two thousand years ago in Bethlehem. I want you to take time this Christmas to bring your attention to the moment the Savior arrived.

In a world that says go big or go home, God entered creation in the most unassuming town, in the most understated circumstance, in a most unassertive form.

November 20, 2025 | Benin **Pastor, Elders Abducted**

On Sunday, July 27, 2025, Islamists entered a church building in northeastern Benin near the end of the service and abducted its pastor and three elders. Persecution is prevalent in the northern part of Benin, where Christians are beaten and sometimes killed and church buildings are routinely destroyed. A senior Beninese pastor requested prayer for the abducted church leaders and that Christians in Benin will remain bold witnesses to Christ amid persecution.

December 11, 2025 | Pakistan **Bible Distribution Continues Amid Floods,** Threats

While flooded rivers and fields have made travel difficult in Pakistan, some Christian teams continue to carry on the important work of distributing Bibles there. Devastating floods have led to the deaths of more than 800 people and forced over 1 million Pakistanis to evacuate their homes and villages. "Please pray for them," said a front-line worker. "It is very difficult, and they need to know where they can go because of the many flooded areas and also because of ongoing security threats." Around 2% of Pakistan's population, roughly about 4 million people, are believed to be Christians. Even during dry seasons, Christians must use care in distributing Bibles, knowing the opposition they could face at the hands of fanatical Muslims.

Christian Family Held Hostage, Now in Hiding


On August 27, 2025, at 1:30 a.m., a group of armed men took a Christian family captive, threatened to bring blasphemy charges against the family and demanded the family pay more than \$150,000 to prevent the accusations. They also threatened to destroy everything the Christians owned. "You will be the next Jaranwala," the abductors said, referencing a riot in August 2023 when Islamic extremists destroyed 26 churches and more than 80 homes in a Christian area after Pakistani Christians were falsely accused of destroying a copy of the Quran.

Front-line workers said this family escaped from their abductors but have since gone into hiding. "The threat of blasphemy is such a weapon," said a front-line worker. "Threats and false claims that someone has committed blasphemy are being used against Christians all over the country. **Please pray for all Pakistani Christians to be safe and have wisdom as they serve Christ.**"

Three Language Groups to Have Bible for First Time

Front-line workers in Nepal report that three language groups will soon have Bibles available in print for the first time. **Praise the Lord** for the years of faithful translation work that have been completed and for the culmination of this work. **Pray for the next steps of the printing and distribution** of God's Word to people who have long waited to have it in their own languages. Finally, **pray that every Bible produced in these new translations will reach fertile ground** and lead to spiritual maturity and church growth among all of Nepal's people groups.


